Ways of Teaching Popular & Common cultures

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Using the "Ways of Teaching Popular & Common Cultures" as guiding principals, use the following questions and strategies to enhance your use of popular music in the classroom.

BIG GUIDING QUESTIONS

- 1. What curricular content do you want to explore with this text?
- 2. What are the themes and main ideas of the text that interest you?
- 3. What are the teaching objectives you want to use this text for?
- 4. What approach (stand-alone, direct link, or Rorschach) seems like the strongest starting point for your teaching of the text?
- 5. How can you differentiate instruction around this text?
- 6. How can you make an engaging and fun student-centered lesson using this text coupled with differentiated activities?

OTHER POINTS OF CONSIDERATION

- 1. Are there any special or interesting circumstances surrounding the production, popularity or uses of the text? Are there things students might want to know about the text's creator?
- 2. What are the interesting or unique musical features/characteristics of the text? For example, if we were studying or producing a music text we might look at timber, tone, mood, melody, harmony, rhythm, dynamics, tempo, meter, instrumentation, editing and sound effects that merit further analysis.
- 3. What other texts (films, comics, radio, books, websites or stories) can this text connect with?
- 4. What text specific terms or vocabulary may need to be defined?
- 5. What misunderstandings might students bring to the text?
- 6. How can you activate the students' prior knowledge to make your lesson more meaningful?
- 7. Does this text reflect on or comment on societal norms and values? If so, how?
